# WHAT IS TITLE I?

Title I is a federally funded program that provides academic support to students in our elementary school. This year our Title I staff will provide reading, math and English as a Second Language services to those students that are referred by their classroom teachers. Title I reading interventions are offered in small groups in the Title I classrooms. Math services are provided mainly in the regular classrooms, with limited pullout for homework assistance. Students who receive ESL services are tutored either individually or in small groups outside of the regular classroom. This is a fluid program that allows us to provide the extra help students need. When students

no longer need extra support they are exited from Title I.

This year's annual Title I Parent Meeting will be held on November 7. Parents whose children have been referred for Title I support will receive a letter in the mail with more information about our program. ## Why are challenging kids challenging? A collaborative problem solving approach

Challenging kids are challenging because they're lacking the skills not to be challenging. If they had the skills, they wouldn't be challenging. That's because – and this is perhaps the key theme of the Collaborative problem solving model – **Kids do well if they can**. And because (here's another key theme) doing well is always preferable to not doing well (if a kid has the skills to do well in the first place). This, of course, is a dramatic departure from the view of challenging kids as atten-

tion-seeking, manipulative, coercive, limit-testing, and poorly motivated. It's a completely different set of lenses, supported by research in the neurosciences over the past 30-40 years, and it has dramatic implications for how caregivers go about helping such kids.

When are challenging kids challenging? When the demands or expectations being placed upon them exceed the skills that they have to respond adaptively. Of course, that's when we all respond maladaptively: when we're lacking the skills to respond adaptively. Thus, an important goal for helpers is to identify the skills a challenging kid is lacking. An even more important goal is to identify the specific expectations a kid is having difficulty meeting (the conditions in which challenging behavior is occurring), referred to as unsolved problems...and to help kids solve those problems. Because unsolved problems tend to be highly predictable, the problem-solving should be proactive most of the time.




